

## WORKS CITED

### Using MLA Style

The Modern Language Association (MLA) has developed the following standardized methods of citing sources for research. Use internal citations or parenthetical references, rather than footnotes, to document your sources within your research paper.

Cite the author's last name and the page number(s) of the source in parentheses following the quote or text being referenced. (Eastman, 15)

### Books

Format: Author's last name, first name. Book Title. City of Publication: Publishing Company, publication date.

Example: Ashworth, William. The Economy of Nature: Rethinking the Connections Between Ecology and Economics. Boston: Houghton Mifflin Company, 1995.

### Magazine Articles

Format: Author's last name, first. "Article Title." Periodical Title. Date. Pages.

Example: Cahan, Vicky. "Waste Not, Want Not? Not Necessarily." Business Week. 17 July 1989. p. 116-17.

### Page from a Website

Format: Author's last name, first name (if given). "Title of page." Website Name. Date page was last updated. Date of Access. <Internet Address>.

Example: "Red Sox, Expos Would Share Fenway for Season." ESPN.com. 25 Oct. 2002. Accessed August 7, 2003. <<http://espn.go.com/mlb/news/2002/1024/1450403.html>>

### Article from an Online Database ( e.g. InfoTrac)

Format: Author's last name, first name. "Article Title." Original Source of Article (Journal Title). Date of original source. Page numbers. Name of Database. Date of Access. <Internet address>.

Example: Walsh, Mark. "Reversal of Ban on Title I Services in Religious Schools Asked." Education Week. Nov. 6, 1996: Vol. 16, Issue 10. p. 24. EBSCO Host Research Databases. Accessed February 27, 2004. <<http://web10.epnet.com/citation.asp>>
